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[ANNUAL REPORT 2021-2022]

The report will take you on a journey of how CHF India foundation implemented the programs on the ground in the year 2021-2022.

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Introduction

CHF India Foundations' Annual Report highlights our programs in the areas of community led solid waste management, supplementary nutrition, Anganwadi development, and charity donation of clothes and schoolbags to an orphanage. We have been able to make a difference due to our strong belief and community participation approach. We got immense support from local communities, parents, self-help groups, grassroots NGOs, and donors, as our change agents. In 2021, CHF India Foundation volunteered for a vaccination drive in Pune and Mumbai city we could reach out to 100000 vulnerable in both cities.

The community-led solid waste management program is implemented in 11 villages of Andhrapradesh, Karnataka and Maharashtra. Since the waste collection falls under the category of essential service, Our waste collectors were working during the lockdown period at the request of respective Gram panchayats. We had an adequate supply of double-layer face masks, face shields, Hand wash, and sanitiser for our waste collectors while collecting waste. Villagers and gram panchayats appreciated their mammoth work during the COVID-19 Pandemic.



In the year 2021 - 2022 we have reached more than 4075 Households. Our continued interaction with the communities, door-to-door visits and

corner meetings have helped to create awareness of the waste segregation at the source, and now 60% of families from host communities practising segregation of waste. Harvested compost was sold at a marginal price to farmers from the villages. To promote organic farming we distributed the compost to the

2. Child centre education development

2.1. Nutrition program :

The program was focused on the provision of nutrition supplements for children in the age group of 3 to 10 yrs. In Anganwadi and Primary School. The program was supported by Bharathi Cement supported the 11 schools and Anganwadi from 9 villages of Kadapa district, Andhra Pradesh. Six Anganwadis from 3 villages of Raichur district Karnataka state were supported by Fullerton India. The Supplementary Nutrition Program provides supplementary nutrition to Anganwadi and Primary school children Through this program, efforts were made to identify the nutrition deficiency of children, for the specific geographical area. The project tried to provide nutrients — such as vitamins, minerals, carbohydrates, protein and fat. The food was locally available and It was cooked in the village with help of SHG women.

2.2.Homestead gardening- Consuming a nutritionally adequate diet is essential for a healthy and active life. So, it is important to provide nutritious food to all the members of the family. The project helped to demonstrate homestead gardens in 21 families in Raichur district Karnataka. The beneficiary could save part of the expenditure which was done for a vegetable purchase. By ensuring a healthy diet, the nutrition status of the family can be improved, thus, decrease in their illness and their expenditure on health. We worked around making homestead gardens by doing the following

- I. Enabled families especially women to grow vegetables for dietary/nutritional requirements as well as income generation.
- II. Provided technical facilitation to beneficiaries for homestead gardening.
- III. Facilitated with seeds and equipment etc. for better output from the garden.
- IV. Trained women in the target area regarding the effective growing of vegetables in the homestead garden.

2.3. Infrastructre Development of Anganwadies

In this year we have developed 4 Anaganwadies in three villages of Andhrapradesh and Karnatka satate. We transformed the Anganwadi into a self-made amusement park for children. The project made Anganwadis attractive for children as well as mothers. Now it is attractive, clean, and has healthy surroundings so that every beneficiary coming there enjoys them.

The following work was done at Three Anganwadi

- I. Set up the hygienic kitchen
- II. School furniture improvement
- III. The compound constructed
- IV. Plantation of trees on the premises of the Anganwadi
- V. Play area exclusively for the children of Anganwadicentre
- VI. Separate, hygienic toilet for the students of Anganwadi
- VII. People’s participation in maintaining the Anganwadicentre
- VIII. Using of Teaching Learning Materials for the Anganwadicentre
- IX. Using graphics and pictures for teaching children at the Anganwadi level.
- X. The children should be taught in other langue such as English other than the vernacular language.
- XI. They should know to count numbers and Shapes.

Teaching by Using Teaching Learning materials: The focus of teaching is based on using different pedagogical teaching-learning methods with students to count numbers in English, learn alphabets and practise pronunciation of words. Usually, the students are introduced to these subjects from the age of five years, but now they are exposed at an early age. Several posters of a vehicle with pictures and everyday objects are displayed to familiarize them with things they encounter regularly.

Installation of play equipment: We have Installed playing material in playgrounds that need to be introduced in the Anganwadi. Hence the project will install age-specific play equipment in a designated play area. The centre should have separate toilets for the kids.



3. Charity at the orphanage–Yerwada Pune

CHF India Foundation with the support of MahendraTech gifted school bags, clothes and innerwear to the 110 children of the orphanage in Yerawada, Pune. People mostly donate food on birthdays and anniversaries, other than food, old clothes, and school uniforms also are donated to the orphanage. While donating old clothes dignity of children is disregarded and the meaning of donation is lost. We got this background while doing the need assessment in the orphanage. The supervisor of the orphanage requested that to donate undergarments, new clothes to use and schoolbags which are more required by children. This request was made to MahendraTech company, they were so kind to donate all the above-mentioned items to the orphanage.

The donation was made to an orphanage named Ghart (John Paul Slum development project) running in the Yerwada Pune for underprivileged children such as children from the streets, sex workers and children from disturbed families. The project is supported by Pune Municipal corporation. They have given the two stored buildings to run this orphanage. The children here are in the age group of 4, years to 15.
